THE UNIVERSITY AND GRADUATE SCHOOL

THE GRADUATE SCHOOL

The Graduate School oversees graduate education at Purdue University. Regardless of your department, all graduate students are officially enrolled and receive their degrees from the Graduate School. Questions about academic requirements, student progress or performance, grievance procedures, and faculty-student relationships that cannot be addressed within individual departments may be directed to the Graduate School deans. Also, the Graduate School has established a formal procedure through which students may appeal decisions made by departmental graduate committees. For more information, please contact the Graduate School, which is located in Young Graduate House and can be reached at 494-2600.

HOW TO GRADUATE IN THE MINIMUM AMOUNT OF TIME (AND OTHER POINTERS)

As with all large organizations, Purdue has its own rules. One of the main reasons that students find themselves here longer than they need to be is that they didn't follow one or more of the rules in order to graduate. PGSG recommends that you get a copy of the following publications:

Obtain these, read, and follow them. As soon as you can, file a plan of study with the Graduate School. A plan of study protects you from changes in your department. If you know the rules, they can

FEE REMISSIONS FOR GRADUATE STUDENTS AND STAFF

Graduate students with assistantships have all but approximately \$550 (depending upon the school) for general fees remitted each semester. Note that as of Fall 2003, international students are also required to pay an additional \$50 per semester to maintain their full-time graduate student status. This fee helps to maintain services provide by the ISS office. These include but are not limited to: tax counseling, reports to home country, visa assistance, and federal reporting. Note that to be paid as a graduate student staff member, an individual must be enrolled as a graduate student in a degree or teacher license program, be registered for at least three credit hours and pay general fees. Also, note that to be paid during the summer, you must register for summer school; however, the fees are half of the normal semester fees. International students who are not on graduate assistantships need to register for at least nine credit hours during the fall and spring semesters to maintain full-time graduate student status. Those students on assistantships require at least six credit hours during the fall and spring semesters. Note that international students do not have to be registered for summer courses to maintain full-time status. For further information, check with the Office of International Students and Scholars (ISS), 494-5770, Room 136, Schleman Hall, for registration details.

RESIDENCE STATUS FOR TUITION PURPOSES

If you are paying your own tuition, the benefits of in-state residency are obvious: in-state fees are much cheaper! If you are on a teaching or research assistantship, your residence classification currently will not affect your out-of-pocket expenses. New rules make it harder to switch from out-of-state to in-state status. International students typically pay out-of-state fees when they are not on graduate assistantships. When they are on an assistantship, international students pay in-state fees.

The Graduate School is responsible for initial residence classification of all graduate students. The Office of the Registrar is responsible for the residence reclassification of continuing students. Each case is considered on an individual basis. It is suggested that you address your residence inquiries to: Office of the Registrar, Room 45, Hovde Hall. You may call 494-6165 to ask questions or make an appointment.

TAXES

Over the past several years, the tax situation for graduate students has changed several times. However, it finally appears that the tax laws have stabilized. You should contact your department head or departmental business office for specific information regarding your tax situation. International graduate staff are required to visit the Payroll Office in Freehafer Hall of Administrative Services as soon as possible.

TEACHING AND RESEARCH ASSISTANTSHIPS

Stipends for all teaching and research assistantships are subject to taxation, and the University is required to withhold taxes from all such payments. Fee remissions for teaching and research assistantships are not subject to taxation. Your teaching and research assistantships are not subject to Social Security withholdings.

FELLOWSHIPS AND SCHOLARSHIPS

The part of a fellowship or a scholarship that is used for tuition and course-related expenses, such as books and supplies, is not taxable. The rest of the fellowship or scholarship (living expenses, travel, etc.) is considered taxable income. The University does not withhold taxes from these awards.

TAX DEFERRED ANNUITY (TDA)

As a graduate student staff member of Purdue University, you may be eligible to participate in a tax deferred annuity (TDA), along with other faculty and staff members. TDAs permit you to accumulate additional retirement savings of your own to supplement retirement benefits from Social Security and other pension plans. Contributions to TDAs are made on a salary reduction or tax deferred basis. This means that money you put into your TDA is not taxed until withdrawn during retirement.

Individuals who begin TDA's early in their careers find that their options are expanded for early retirement and higher income levels during retirement. While you may start a TDA at any time, the earlier started, the greater the flexibility provided.

If you are interested in starting a TDA, you may do so at any time during the year by calling the Retirement Office in Personnel Services at 494-1693. You may change the amount of the TDA contribution only once each calendar year.

PURDUE LIBRARIES

Purdue has a decentralized library system. The Purdue University Libraries consist of the HSSE (Humanities, Social Science, and Education) Library in Stewart Center, the John W. Hicks Undergraduate Library, underground in front of Stewart Center, and 13 school and departmental libraries located throughout the campus. The libraries you probably will use the most are the school or departmental libraries associated with your field of interest and the HSSE Library, because of its function as the central library.

The complete card catalog for all the University's libraries (through 1990), the Interlibrary Loan Service, the majority of the master's and Ph.D. theses written at Purdue, and a number of other services are available in the HSSE Library, with the entrance located on the first floor of Stewart Center.

The John W. Hicks Undergraduate Library is oriented toward undergraduate students, with an emphasis on general reference materials, popular reading materials (i.e., paperbacks, magazines, American and foreign newspapers), lots of study space, extended hours, and a comfortable lounge. Adjoining the undergraduate library is a 24-hour study lounge. The Instructional Media Center and various reserve materials are located in the lower level of the Undergraduate Library.

Since 1998, the libraries have an integrated on-line library system that provides computerized access to all materials acquired since 1976. Each library has terminals that allow users to search the catalog by author, title, keyword, or subject. In addition, substantial databases are available through THOR for journals in many different disciplines. These search engines help graduate

students locate journals in their field of interest e.g. Biological Abstracts for the Sciences and the Social Science Citation Index for Humanities. THOR also is available through any terminal on the campus computer network through the World Wide Web. The URL address is:

Another useful source of academic research can be found at the URL address:
<http://www.webofscience.com>. Furthermore, Purdue libraries are gradually moving into the realm of electronic journals so that articles are now readily accessible online (typically in PDF formats). This is especially the case for newer articles, that is, those published within the last 5 years. Graduate students thus have the option of saving the document in a .pdf file format for later reading or printing it out at the computer terminal. To see if your journal is available online, visit:

Photocopiers are available in nearly all of the libraries. The best (and quickest) way to make copies is to get a CopyCard, which is a debit card one can use in any copier. The cards are available at any of the large libraries and can be purchased with cash or a departmental account number. Copying made with a CopyCard costs a penny less per page than copying made with change. Not all departments provide funding for copy cards. Blue copy cards can be purchased with cash, while yellow copy cards can be purchased with departmental account numbers.

FINANCIAL AID AND STUDENT EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES

Each year, approximately 60% of Purdue's graduate students are supported by graduate appointments. It is in your best interest to keep abreast of the changing financial situation and financial assistance opportunities available. A description of selected fellowships, traineeships, and appointments for graduate students is available in the Graduate School, Room 160, Young Graduate House or may be accessed via the Graduate School's Home Page at:
<http://www.gradschool.purdue.edu/>. This comprehensive listing presents a summary of appointments available throughout the University and is a very good starting point. International students typically are not eligible for any fellowships funded by the federal government, and

can only work a maximum of 20 hours (0.50 FTE) per week during the fall and spring semesters. They are, however, allowed to work the full 40 hours per week during the summer. For additional inquiries, please check with the Office of International Students and Scholars (ISS), 494-5770, Room 136, Schleman Hall, about employment and other restrictions.

The Division of Financial Aid Office, located on the third floor of Schleman Hall, can assist you with student loans. You need to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) in order to have eligibility determined for federal student loans. The FAFSA is available in the third floor lobby of Schleman Hall. You also may request a FAFSA application through the Financial Aid Voice Response System by calling 494-5050 or file online at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

The Division of Financial Aid Student Employment Office in Schleman Hall maintains a centralized listing of jobs on the Student Services Information On-line (SSINFO) system daily. SSINFO lists on-campus student employment and off-campus work. These job listings also are aired by the Center for Instructional Services (CIS) Purdue Cable channel. The teletext service can be seen on Insight Communications, Channel 5, and University Residence Television Antenna System, Channel 15. Keep on the lookout for opportunities to work with professors on projects, as consultants in computer labs, as residence hall counselors, or in the various jobs in the Student Union, etc.

SSINFO (STUDENT SERVICES INFORMATION ON-LINE)

SSINFO, or Student Service: information Online, is a tool that you will want to know as soon as possible. You can use it to access your personal information, such as your course and exam schedules, your academic records (your grades will be posted here), make transcript requests, and also change your residential address etc. Other services provided by SSINFO include housing information, financial aid information, employment information and Purdue's Electronic Directory Services, including email addresses. MAIL* HUB

Mail*Hub is the University-wide email directory service. It can be used to look up anyone at the University, change your profile, and forward your Purdue email to any email address you specify. To find out more about Mail*Hub, visit <http://directory.purdue.edu/>.

- Purdue Bands (494-3952): Don't let the name fool you. Purdue actually has an orchestra and a marching band, as well as several jazz and concert bands. Most concerts are free and there are frequent performances.

- Civic Theater of Greater Lafayette (formerly Monon Depot Theater), 313 North 5th Street (423-7529): This small and intimate theater sets the scene for many locally produced plays and lesser known concerts.
- Lafayette Symphony Orchestra, 111 North 6th Street (742-6463)
- Long Center for the Performing Arts, 111 North 6th Street (742-5664): A large and decorative theater (Historic Mars Theater) is used for the more prominent performances that come to Lafayette, as well as movies and theater organ recitals.
- Riehle Plaza, Second Street (476-4407): The new railroad depot and walking bridge across the Wabash River connecting Lafayette to West Lafayette features concerts and other events near the depot.
- Lafayette Arts and Crafts Market: Every Saturday, May-October 6:30AM-12:00PM, 5th and South Street in Lafayette.
- Lafayette Farmers Market: Every Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, May-October, 6:30AM-12:00PM, 5th and South Street in Lafayette.

ANNUAL EVENTS

- Black History Month (494-3092): Every year during the month of February, the Black Cultural Center puts together a series of lectures, performances, movies, and other social and cultural activities. Visit <http://www.purdue.edu/bcc>.

- Springfest (494-4554): In an effort to reach a broad range of people with entomology, Bug Bowl was created to teach people about insects. This annual event, held in April, is sponsored by the Department of Entomology.
- Concert Under the Stars Series: The University Bands present, a week-long series of free concerts in mid-April at Slayter Hill. The most well known of these concerts is the "1812" Concert. Contact the Bands general office at 494-3952 for more information.
- Dancing in the Streets (742-2313): Held in late summer, this is a downtown back-to-the-50's night and includes outdoor food booths, street dancing, and a classic car show.
- Feast of the Hunter's Moon (476-8411 or 476-8402): This is an annual event held in October at Fort Ouiatenon, featuring a recreation of an 18th Century French and Indian encampment on the banks of the Wabash River.
- Grand Prix: Racing fans, this mid-April event is for you. A go-cart version of the Indianapolis 500 is held on the racetrack north of the football stadium. For more information, call 494-7527.
- Indiana Fiddlers' Gathering (742-1419): Held the last weekend in June, this is a weekend festival of traditional folk, bluegrass, and country music on the grounds of the Tippecanoe Battlefield.
- International Food Bazaar (743-4353)
- The International Center holds an international food bazaar in the spring. Traditional cuisine from all over the world is available for sampling at a very nominal charge.
- Purdue Christmas Show (494-3941): Over 36,000 people attend the annual PMO Christmas Show, which is held in the Elliott Hall of Music during December.
- Round the Fountain Art Fair (742-2313): Held on Saturday of the Memorial Day weekend at the end of May, on the Courthouse grounds, this fair features the juried works of about 100 regional artists.
- Stars and Stripes (742-6463): This is the annual Independence Day celebration (July 4), featuring the Lafayette Citizens Bank in an outdoor concert at the Train Depot in Lafayette, followed by fireworks.
- The Strawberry Festival (742-0075): Sponsored each June by the YWCA, this festival offers strawberry shortcake, music, crafts, and children's games.
- Taste of Tippecanoe (423-2787): Tippecanoe Arts Federation annually sponsors this event in June, which has become the most popular event

for sampling great food and local music.

- Centennial Park, Corner of Lawn & Vine Streets: Playground and small shelter for picnics.
- Cumberland Park, Cumberland Avenue and Salisbury Street
- Fort Ouiatenon (476-8402): This fort has picnic and recreation areas, and a boat launch on the Wabash River. Admission is free, and the park is open from 8 a.m. until dusk.
- Happy Hollow Park, Happy Hollow Road: 68 acre park with playground, picnic shelters, softball, volleyball, hiking trails, and sled run.
- Horticulture Park, Airport Road and State Street: Adjacent to the president's mansion and maintained by Purdue, a 24-acre woodland park for a serene walk or jog with plenty of birds and squirrels to watch.
- Lommel Park, Essex Street and Wilshire Avenue: Picnic shelter, playground, and softball area.
- Mascouten Park, North River Road near Happy Hollow Road intersection: Picnic areas, playground, boat launch, and fishing.
- McCormick's Woods, Cherry Lane and McCormick Road: Enter this hiking trail from Cherry Lane and enjoy a peaceful walk through the woods.
- Pickett Memorial Park, Stadium Avenue and McCormick Road: Picnic areas and open fields located on the Purdue campus. Reserve the picnic area at the Co-Rec.
- Ross-Hill Park, South River Road: Picnic shelter, playground, softball area, and hiking trails.
- Tapawingo Park, Brown Street Levee by the Wabash: Lighted volleyball, basketball, and tennis courts, playground, picnic areas, and fishing.
- Tommy Johnston Park, Wood and Chauncey Avenue: Basketball, volleyball, picnic shelter, and playground with lots of sand.

Lafayette

- Battle Ground Historical Park, Tippecanoe Battlefield (567-2147): This national historic landmark boasts a 104 acre park, museum, picnic areas, and historic and scenic trails.

Short Drives

- Clegg Botanical Gardens (423-1325): Located at 1845 North on County Road 400 East. Wander through the trails of this wooded area with numerous cultivated and natural plants. Open to the public (and free) from 10 a.m. to sunset every day. The spring wildflowers are the best in the area.
- Martel Woods: Several hundred acres. Entrance off 725 West between State Road 26 and Division Road about 8 miles west of West Lafayette. Tree plantations, fields, and native woodlands. Owned by the Purdue Department of Forestry. Excellent for a quiet walk in solitude.
- Purdue Wildlife Area: Entrance via driveway at 8003 State Road 26 about 9 miles northwest of Lafayette. Owned by Purdue University. Visitors must sign in. Marshes, fields, and small woods. Good in spring and fall for aquatic wildlife.

- Wabash Heritage Trail: This is a very nice trail along the river that starts at the Tippecanoe Battlefield, comes to Riehle Plaza in downtown Lafayette, crosses the Pedestrian Bridge to West Lafayette and continues south along the banks of the Wabash river to Fort Ouiatenon.
- Wolf Educational and Research Wildlife Park (567-2265): Examine a pack of wolves and a herd of bison up close and discuss their behavior with researchers. See <http://www.wolfpark.org>.

Longer Scenic Drives

- Brown County (812) 988-6406: Famous for its scenic forest, Brown County State Park is located approximately 50 miles south of Indianapolis near the junction of State Roads 135 and 46.
- Conner Prairie (317)776-6000 or (800)966-1836: Located on the north side of Indianapolis (near Carmel), Conner Prairie is a living-history museum. This translates into people dressed, working, and behaving as they would have in 1836.
- Fall Creek Gorge Nature Preserve (Potholes Preserve): Located in Warren County, near Kramer. Take 41 North from Indiana 28 and 1.5 miles after 41 North separates from Indiana 28, there is a high voltage transformer. At that location, turn right (east) onto a gravel road (025 East). The preserve serve is on the left side, before a small bridge crossing Fall Creek. The preserve is owned by the Nature Conservancy and features trails, cliffs, streams, potholes, and a waterfall. In the summer, many people like to splash through the potholes, but in the spring or fall, few people visit this lovely preserve. No fee.
- Fort Harrison State Park, 5751 Glenn Road, northeast Indianapolis, (317) 591-0904: This park has 1700 acres for fun and recreation, offering hiking and biking trails, horseback riding, fishing and picnicking.
- Indiana Beach (574) 583-4141: Located on the shores of Lake Shafer, north of Monticello.
- Indiana Dunes (219) 926-1952
- Located on the shores of Lake Michigan, Indiana Dunes National Lakeshore and Indiana Dunes State Park are Indiana's answer to the coastlines.
- Indianapolis Zoo (317) 630-2001: This city zoo opened in 1988 and is hailed as one of the most modern designs of any urban zoo in the country. It is located at 1200 West Washington Street.
- Portland Arch Nature Preserve: This attractive

wooded area with streams and a natural arch is well worth the drive. It is a beautiful place for a walk or a picnic. It also features an interesting plant community. State nature preserve. No fee.

- Rockville: The scenic route to Rockville, Terre Haute, and the surrounding area has many old covered bridges, many of which you still can drive over. Very scenic in early spring and fall!
- Shades State Park (765) 435-2810: Just 17 miles south of Crawfordsville on State Road 47 in Waveland, the park offers beautiful sandstone cliffs and shady ravines for hikers and picnickers. Canoeists can also paddle along Sugar Creek.
- Turkey Run (765) 597-2635: Located off State Road 47 southwest of Crawfordsville, this park features miles of trails through deep sandstone ravines and stands of aged forests along the Sugar Creek.

BARS

We have compiled a listing of our popular bars in West Lafayette and Lafayette. This is only a sampling of the bars in the area; there are several others to visit in the Greater Lafayette Area. Note that the drinking age in Indiana is 21, and you can expect to be carded in most bars. Indiana law does permit you to be in a bar/restaurant if you are under 21 if you are accompanied by your parents, but most establishments prefer that you not push this rule.

In Indiana, beer and wine can be sold in grocery and drug stores. Liquor can be sold in liquor stores and some drug stores, but there are limits on the total volume a drug store can sell to one customer. Many bars offer a "carry-out" service, but remember that Indiana now has an "opencontainer" law, which prohibits open containers of alcohol in motor vehicles.

Indiana law restricts the sale of alcohol on Sundays to restaurants only (with no "carry-outs" allowed). However, most bars qualify as restaurants because they serve some kind of food.

CAMPUS HOUSING

Graduate students can choose to live either on campus or off campus. The University offers on campus housing through Hawkins Hall for single students, Purdue Village for married students, and also off-campus housing through the Purdue Research Foundation.

Hawkins hall provides double and single rooms for single students. Many other facilities such as washers and dryers, gymnasium, and food services also are provided. A student needs to sign a contract to live there, which is binding for the full academic year unless you leave Purdue. The Purdue Village offers housing for married graduate students and single parents on the southwest side of campus. DON'T LIKE TO PAY FOR YOUR HOUSING?

You can also be a graduate staff resident for Hawkins hall with a primary role of acting as a liaison between management and student residents. You are also expected to handle weekend desk duty, serve as temporary building deputy, and assist in planning social activities for the resident graduate students. This requires a maximum of 20 hours per week: a small price to pay for a private room, phone, and remission of University fees and tuition except for staff fees. The University also tacks on a cash stipend. Applications may be obtained at the office of either Graduate House.

You can also be a resident assistant (RA) for undergraduate halls. This job is equivalent to a regular part-time job and requires you to be "on duty" at least four nights a week to enforce the University's many rules for undergraduate residents. The University pays tuition, provides free room and board, and also pays a small stipend. OFF-CAMPUS HOUSING

The most common approach to housing is to live off campus. This is an involved topic, and the best method would be to consult one of the publications available from the Office of the Dean of Students in Schleman Hall. Off-Campus Housing Services, which is the largest housing resource, can be a big help in locating an apartment. Most local landlords require 12-month leases, although some six- and nine-month leases are available. Typically shorter leases will result in higher rental fees. One also may sublease an apartment for a semester or a summer session from someone leaving campus. One should be careful to make sure that certain specifics are placed in writing in the lease. These include specification of who is responsible for repairs and

maintenance, including mowing the lawn and snow removal; what utilities are included in the rent; and when the security deposit will be returned. You can visit SSINFO at www.ssinfo.purdue.edu, which maintains a searchable list of apartments under the housing option in the student life section. For most of the apartments, a security deposit, ranging from \$50 to two month's rent, is required and is returned in full if no damages are found when you move out. When entering in a housing contract or lease, it is important to know your rights and also those of your landlord. These rights are permitted by Indiana State Law; more information can be obtained for free from: Indiana Legal Services, 639 Columbia Street, P.O. Parking near rental property can be difficult. Many of the larger streets in West Lafayette have parking restrictions on one or both sides at certain hours, or all the time. You should examine the parking situation before renting. As far as transportation to campus is concerned, if you live more than 1.5 miles from the campus, you may apply for a commuter parking permit from Purdue. Information about the local transportation system can be obtained by calling Greater Lafayette Public Transportation Corporation (GLPTC) at 742-7433. For more details, please see the transit and parking at Purdue sections of this chapter.

As you look for apartments, keep in mind that many complexes have 5-10% discounts off monthly rent for graduate staff. Research assistants, teaching assistants, and students on fellowships qualify for such discounts. Contact the leasing offices of the apartment complexes you are interested in to see if they offer such discounts.

If utilities are not included and you must pay them yourself, the utility companies can give you figures showing the past electricity and gas expenses for the apartment in which you are interested.

BANKING

Three banks/credit unions are located on campus: the Purdue Employees Federal Credit Union (PEFCU), Bank One, and Huntington National Bank. All of these and others have Automatic Teller Machines (ATM) on or around campus.

PEFCU (497-3328): Popular PEFCU accounts with students include free world-wide checking, share draft checking, split-rate savings accounts, and car loans. PEFCU also offers a Visa Card to its members. This card has a substantially lower interest rate (see PEFCU for current rate) than most, there is no annual fee, and an immediate credit line of \$2,500 may be offered to graduate students on assistantships. The PEFCU branches are located near the campus at 540 Northwestern Avenue and also in the Purdue Memorial Union.

Bank One (423-0300) offers two campus locations, multiple locations in the West Lafayette/Lafayette area, and 24-hour cash machines throughout the area including certain residence halls. They have a variety of checking accounts and offer wire transfers. Bank One locations near the campus are at 210 West State Street (across from Chauncey Village: 423-0201) and 309 Sagamore Parkway, West (423-0428).

VOTER REGISTRATION

You also may register to vote when you register your car. (See details at the Auto License Branch located near the County Court Houses.)

INDIANA DRIVER'S LICENSE

In order to obtain an Indiana driver's license, you must surrender your present driver's license, take a written test and a vision test. If you have an out-of-district or out-of-country license, or you have never had a license, you will need to take a written test, vision test, and a driving test. If you are only renewing an Indiana state license, you probably will not be asked to take a written test, but you will have to take a vision test. Those who need to take the written test should obtain a copy of the Indiana Driver's Manual to study for it. International students can get a certified translation from your home country to be able to speed up the license process. Due to stricter guidelines following 9/11, international students may need to bring their passports to a license branch in order to process their license and vehicle registration. Please check with a local licensing branch for further information. The West Lafayette license branch is located on 720 West Navajo Street (call: 464-1525) and the Lafayette license branch is located on the north end of Lafayette at 2200 Elmwood Avenue, behind the Market Square Shopping Center (call 448-3738). License branch hours for both locations are 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Fridays; 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. on Wednesdays; and 8:30 a.m. to 6:30 p.m. on Thursdays. Please make sure to call

ahead of time for office hours and fees.

INDIANA AUTOMOBILE REGISTRATION

To obtain an Indiana license plate, you must bring your title and proof of insurance (with policy number) to either of the Auto License Branches mentioned above. If you have a loan on your car, the lien-holder may have the title. In this case, you should take the name and complete address of the lien-holder to the Auto License Branch. They will write to the lien-holder to obtain a copy of the title and inform you when they receive it. It is recommended that the Auto License Branch be avoided at the beginning and the end of the month, as these are the most crowded times. WEST LAFAYETTE'S RULES

- Noise ordinance: Excessive noise can mean a fine of \$53 to \$300 and a trip to the West Lafayette court. It is in effect all day, every day, but is most often cited at night. Usually, you get a warning visit first, but if the officers come back a second time, you can expect a citation.
- Limits on Number of Roommates: Usually no more than three unrelated persons may occupy any house or apartment in the city, and many apartments are zoned for fewer occupants. The city tries to maintain housing standards through housing inspection every two years. You should contact the Department of Development (775-5160) to determine the allowable occupancy of specific properties.
- Parking: Parking in the business district is limited to two hours in any one parking space. In the areas adjacent to campus, public parking may be limited to either one, two or three hours in any one spot. Parking on any city street for longer than 24 hours is prohibited and may result in towing at the owner's expense. Parking on the space between the sidewalk and curb, on the sidewalk, and in front of driveways or fire hydrants is prohibited, as well as unauthorized parking on private property.
- Residences: Cutting trees in the public right of way requires a permit from the Engineering Department (775-5130). Sidewalks must be cleared of snow six hours after a snowfall or sunrise. Littering is prohibited—no trash or junk should be visible on the property.
- Pets: Dogs are not allowed to run loose or to create noise or smells that annoy neighbors or

other citizens, and they must be licensed.

- Public intoxication: It can lead to arrest in situations of vandalism, fighting, and loitering. No person shall bring into, have, keep, carry, serve, or drink any intoxicating beverage within the city parks (or on campus).

PARKING AT PURDUE

A summary of the rules and regulations for parking is given here. For complete information, consult the booklet entitled, Traffic and Parking Regulations, which is available at the Visitor Information and Parking Services Center located in the Northwestern Avenue Parking Garage, call 494-9494, or visit:

If you are going to park on campus, you must get a parking permit, especially if you intend to park during the "Restricted Hours," which are 7 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday every week of the year, whether or not the university is officially in session.

If you are employed by the University at least 3/4 time, you are considered as staff and qualify for an A or a B parking permit. The difference is that you pay more for an A permit for the privilege of parking in the "better" spaces. Usually that means that with an A permit you can park in the lower levels of the garages, while with a B permit, you will have to climb a few flights of stairs. Please contact the parking office for rates for A and B parking. They can be found on the parking website.

Unfortunately, international graduate students are not eligible for either the A or B permits because US immigration restricts international students to only 20 hours (1/2 time employment) of work per week.

If you live about 1.5 miles or more from campus, you may be eligible to get a C permit. There will be two types of C permits available, a surface lot permit or a garage lot permit. You will need to bring proof of your address and driver's license. The precise boundary for the C permit is listed in the Traffic and Parking Regulations booklet. The C

parking spaces usually are found on the top levels of the parking garages and in lots on the edge of campus. You can confirm the availability of these permits and verify rates by calling parking office at 494-9494 or by visiting the Purdue parking website.

Students are not allowed to park at visitors' meters on campus. If you do get a ticket, you have the right to appeal. You must report to the Visitor Information and Parking Services Center within 10 days and fill out a request for appeal. A \$3 late fee will be added if you do not appeal and do not pay your fine within 10 days. Your case will be heard by the Student Court. If you feel you've been wronged, by all means appeal, as people frequently do win their appeals!

BIKES

You should have your bike registered with the West Lafayette Police Department (WLPD) in case it gets stolen. You should be aware that a bicycle that is registered can receive a ticket if it is not parked at a legal site (bicycle racks). Outside the University, if racks are available, bicycles should be parked in places that cause minor obstruction to pedestrians. Bikes are not allowed in the buildings. Check the city ordinance for more information (775-5100). Outside the campus, bicycles cannot be ridden on the sidewalk. The WLPD is located at 609 West Navajo, and registration costs \$1. Call 775-5210 for information.

LOCAL BUS SERVICE

Greater Lafayette Public Transportation Corp. (GLPTC) (742-RIDE): Flash your student ID and it's free! Purdue students ride all CityBus routes for free - all the time! All students have to do is flash their valid Purdue student ID to the bus driver when boarding the bus. Whether traveling around campus on one of the Campus Loop routes or going to the Tippecanoe Mall, all CityBus routes are free. HEALTH CARE

Purdue University Student Health Center (PUSH) (494-1700): The Student Health Center provides comprehensive medical and mental health care to Purdue students and their spouses. It is an accredited ambulatory health care facility that provides outpatient care, excluding maternity and pediatric services. The health center is staffed by full-time physicians, including one psychiatrist.

According to a brochure distributed by the Purdue University Student Health Center, the student health fee entitles you to the following:

1. An unlimited number of visits to the PUSH outpatient clinic. (There is a charge for minor office procedures.)
2. Diet therapy consultations.
3. A limited number of hours (per semester) of consultation with the mental health service staff.
4. The services of the "Urgent Care" physician. A patient is charged for use of the "Urgent Care" facility, supplies, and medication.

You may walk in any time during outpatient hours to see a physician or nurse practitioner. However, if your concern is less urgent, it is recommended that you make an appointment to see a physician. Visit <http://www.purdue.edu/push> for more information.

STUDENT HEALTH INSURANCE

Purdue has a University-subsidized health insurance program, which includes vision, for graduate student staff members who have at least a half-time assistantship (teaching, research, or administrative/professional). Graduate students on fellowships also receive a supplement for medical insurance. All graduate staff must carry the University policy unless they can show healthcare coverage under a different policy. Those who do not hold assistantships are eligible to participate in the voluntary student health insurance program. All international graduate students are required to have health insurance while they are enrolled at Purdue. Graduate students who are on 0.5FTE assistantships will automatically be covered under staff health insurance. The current fee of \$18 per month is automatically deducted from your monthly salary unless otherwise specified. However, international graduate students who are only on 0.25FTE assistantships will have to obtain the student health insurance coverage which can range between \$300-\$400 each semester. Please refer to the student health insurance brochure included in your welcome folder for more information.

Eligible graduate staff are enrolled automatically for single coverage in the university plan and are provided information regarding enrollment for spouses and dependents. Information is provided to each eligible graduate staff member at the time payroll is activated. Coverage becomes effective with the first day of employment and continues as long as employed in an eligible position. For more information, please contact your departmental business office.

Supplemental dental insurance is now available for an additional cost. For further information or enrollment material, call 1-800-237-0903.

Enrollment in this program is voluntary. Make sure there are physicians that meet your needs in the Greater Lafayette area before you enroll.
